Case Study: Ravi the Artist

On my first day of school in India way back in May 2001 I laid out a mat and started teaching. I will never forget the little boy that was crying on the opposite side of the road because he didn't have anyone to bring him to 'school'. Caught up in my chaos, it took a week to find someone he was comfortable with bring him across, but he finally attended and finally stopped crying—that was Ravi(4).

Ravi has always had a thirst for knowledge, but was never given the chance to nourish it. His father was supportive, but his mother thought begging was more important. Up until 2005 when his father died, he and his brother Raju were allowed to attend school, but after that they were pulled in and out and not able to keep up.



In 2013, old enough to make his own decisions at 15, Ravi returned to classes and has rarely missed a day since. He is a volunteer/staff favourite; listens well, tries hard and is always happy. His smile and easy going nature have built trust with the One! team. He is employed at the Khar school doing odd jobs like garbage disposal, escorting young students to and from school, Xerox, etc. He does everything with a smile! His mom has been pushing for him to drop out, but he refuses.

Now 16, Ravi wants to register for Grade 10 next year and pursue art like his role model Sunil.
